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About the Conference



The Graduate Student Conference was named for Dean James F. Jakobsen in 2001 in honor of his long-standing commitment to graduate student education and his work with the Graduate Student Senate (GSS). He served as the liaison to GSS for many years, attending our meetings assiduously. His advice and support have helped make our organization what it is today. In 1998, Dean Jakobsen retired as Associate Dean of the Graduate College after 30 years of service.

He began his work at The University of Iowa in the Mathematics Department after earning his Ph.D. from the University of Missouri in 1959. After serving as the chair of his department, he began his career in the Graduate College in 1968. Dean Jakobsen has worked on numerous projects that have directly benefited graduate students during his tenure at Iowa. He helped establish the D.C. Spriestersbach Distinguished Dissertation Prize, the T. Anne Cleary Fellowships, the Graduate Opportunity Fellowships, and the Seashore/Ballard Dissertation Fellowship. He was instrumental in the development and implementation of the summer outreach program: CIC SROP program, which has been in existence since 1986 on our campus. In addition to his work with the GSS, Dean Jakobsen helped to recruit underrepresented minorities, women, and international students. In addition, he helped design the ad hoc Interdisciplinary Ph.D. program. Most importantly, Dean Jakobsen is well known for his humility, personal attention to students, and commitment to excellence. Although Dean Jakobsen passed away in 2016, we hope that the Conference continues to live up to his outstanding reputation as it provides an opportunity for graduate students to present their work and explore interdisciplinary perspectives.

Claire Whitehurst, School of Art and Art History MFA in Painting

Claire Whitehurst is an artist living and working in Iowa City, Iowa, where she is teaching and pursuing her MFA in Painting at the University of Iowa. 2018 Jakobsen Conference Keynote Speaker

Dr. Jeffrey D. Dawson will deliver his address, “The Mosaic Metaphor of Collaborations” during the Jakobsen Conference closing Reception & Awards Ceremony.



Dr. Dawson is a professor of Biostatistics and the Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs in the UI College of Public Health. He received his bachelor’s degree in Statistics from Brigham Young University and his doctorate in Biostatistics from Harvard University. He has collaborated with faculty from dozens of departments from among all of the UI colleges. He has co-authored over 170 publications, with at least 16 articles each in the areas of driver safety, cardiovascular health, infectious diseases, and family medicine. His methodological interests include clinical trials, longitudinal data, and time series data. He has taught a variety of general and specialty courses in biostatistics, developing such courses as “Scholarly Integrity in Biostatistics” and “Introduction to Public Health Methods.” He served as his department’s first Director of Graduate Studies for nine years and has been

the Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs since 2011. He has served in the UI Faculty Senate, the UI Institutional Review Board, and his college’s Faculty Council. He received his college’s Faculty Service Award in 2004, and his community service efforts have included a variety of educational, clinical, and outreach activities in Haiti since 2009. In 2016 he was named a Fellow of the American Statistical Association, an honor limited to 0.3% of association members annually.

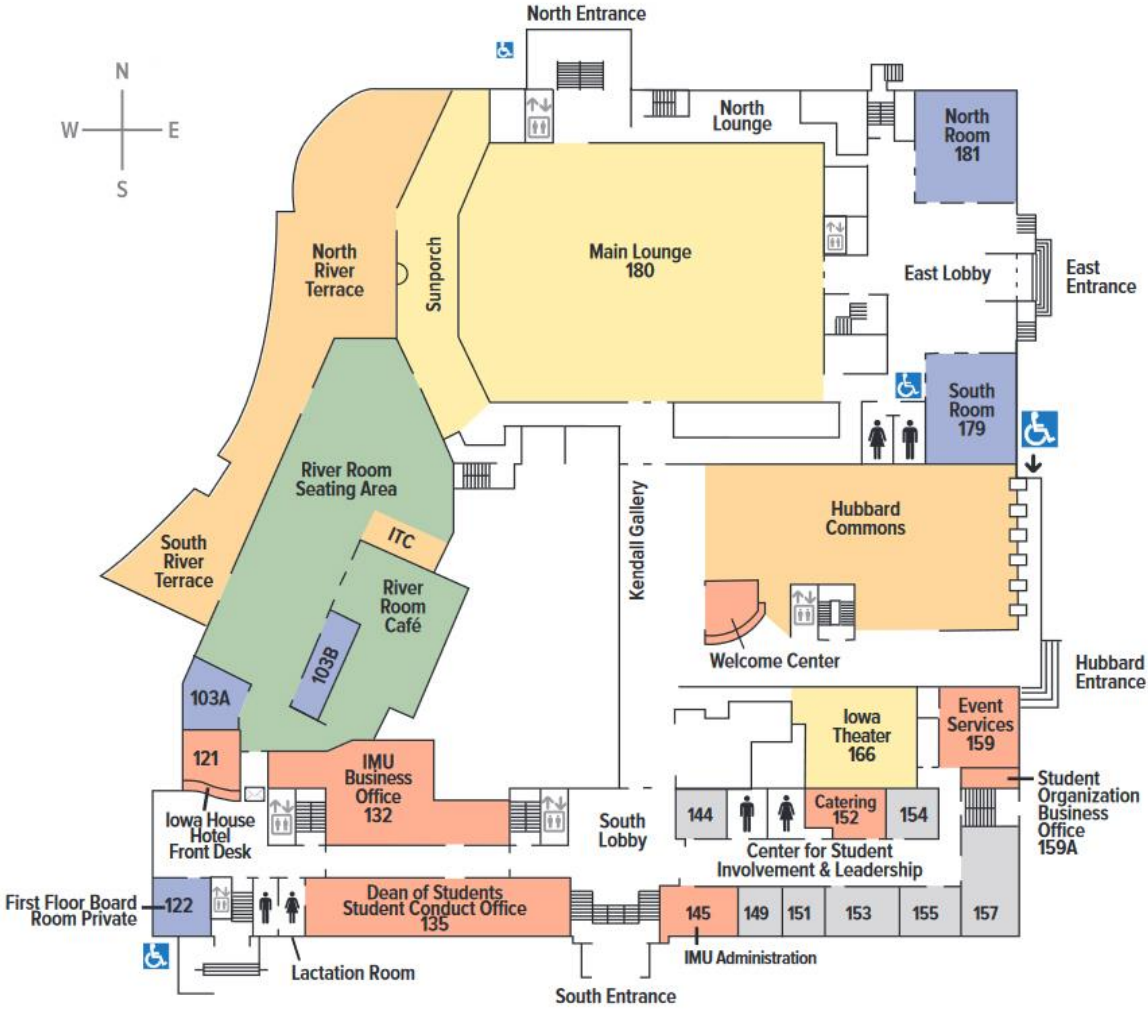

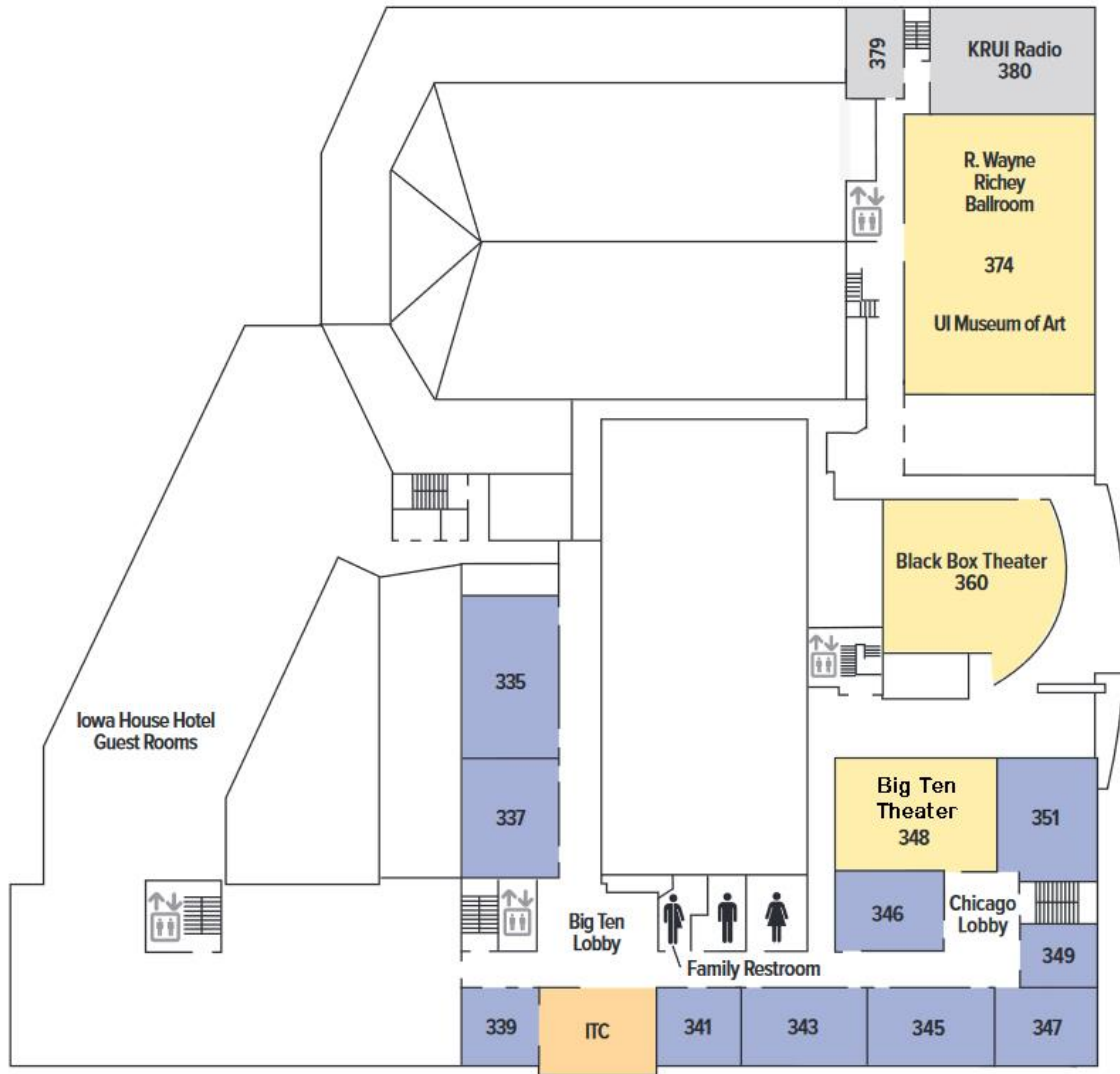
